15. Multidisciplinary / interdisciplinary

Since its inception, the College has embraced an interdisciplinary approach to education. While its foundation lies in commerce, the curriculum integrates diverse academic perspectives. Undergraduate programs such as B.Com. and BBA offer a variety of optional subjects, including English, Marathi, Hindi, Economics, Law, Mathematics, Statistics, and Computer Applications. BBA specializations go beyond traditional commerce, covering areas like Finance, Marketing, Human Resources, International Business, Retail Operations, and Computer Applications. In addition, the College has recently introduced a B.Voc. program in Banking, Finance, and Insurance with a focus on Actuarial Studies, blending academic rigor with industry

relevance. At the postgraduate level, the College offers a robust Ph.D. research program spanning disciplines such as Accountancy, Business Economics, Business Administration, Business Practices, Banking and Finance, and Cost and Works Accounting. Additionally, specialized Postgraduate Diploma programs are available in Taxation Law, Banking, Finance and Insurance, and International Business, catering to evolving industry demands.

16.Academic bank of credits (ABC):

The College actively promotes student registration on the Academic Bank of Credits (ABC) portal, an initiative by the Ministry of Education, Government of India. A substantial number of students have successfully created accounts and are now leveraging the platform's features to enhance their academic journey.

17.Skill development:

The College emphasizes holistic skill development through a comprehensive approach that integrates academic programs, extracurricular activities, and community engagement. In line with the National Education Policy (NEP), the institution offers a skill-based, apprenticeship-embedded degree program, B.Voc. in Banking, Finance, and Insurance with Actuarial Studies, designed to equip students with industry-relevant expertise. To enhance employability, the College Placement Cell conducts workshops, seminars, guest lectures, and training programs focusing on essential skills. It also facilitates internships and placement opportunities for students seeking professional growth. Additionally, the College organizes industrial visits and study tours, providing students with practical, hands-on learning experiences to bridge the gap between academics and industry.

To accommodate the diverse needs and expectations of students from varied socio-cultural backgrounds, the College provides instruction in both English and Marathi. Additionally, students can choose other Indian languages as subjects within their undergraduate programs, broadening their academic and cultural horizons. Acknowledging the significance of preserving cultural heritage, the College has established student associations such as the Marathi Vangmay Mandal, Hindi Association, and Book Lovers Group. These associations actively organize events and activities that enhance language proficiency while promoting the preservation of cultural values and traditions.

The affiliating university adopts a forward-thinking approach to curriculum design, focusing on clearly defined learning objectives and outcomes for all graduate and postgraduate programs. Aligned with this vision, the College ensures its faculty have sufficient time to adapt their teaching methodologies to the principles of outcome-based education. This approach enables students to achieve the knowledge and skills specified in the curriculum effectively. Faculty members actively employ a variety of teaching-learning pedagogies, utilizing diverse instructional methods to enhance the learning experience.

The affiliating university provides distance education programs designed for students who cannot attend regular classes. To facilitate this, the College has set up a dedicated Centre for the School of Open and Distance Learning, under the university's affiliation. With a committed Coordinator, the center actively supports students in pursuing higher education opportunities that might otherwise be out of reach. Additionally, the College offers dedicated faculty and resources to assist these learners. In its effort to promote online learning, the College has established itself as a local chapter of SWAYAM/NPTEL. It actively encourages students to explore and enroll in the diverse range of courses available on these platforms.

Aligned with this vision, the College follows a structured process for curriculum planning and implementation. As an affiliated institution of Savitribai Phule Pune University (SPPU), it adheres to the university's guidelines and syllabus while contributing through faculty representation in curriculum development. Program outcomes, program-specific outcomes, and course outcomes are clearly defined and assessed through diverse methods such as assignments, presentations, class tests, and case studies. Feedback from students and recruiters further ensures curriculum relevance and effectiveness.

To bridge academia and industry, the College offers skill-based

add-on courses through MOUs with professional bodies and organizes guest lectures, workshops, and company visits for practical exposure. The College's Placement Cell actively enhances employability through training and internship opportunities.

Student creativity and holistic development are fostered through various activity cells, encouraging leadership and participation. Rigorous monitoring at the department level ensures seamless curriculum delivery, aligned with the College's mission of offering market-oriented, value-driven education that prepares students for professional success and societal contribution.

1.1.2 - The institution adheres to the academic calendar including for the conduct of Continuous Internal Evaluation (CIE)

The M.Com., B.Com., BBA, BBA (IB), BBA (CA), and B.Voc. (BFSI with Actuarial Studies) programs incorporate continuous internal evaluation components, including practical courses. The Chief Examination Officer, along with the Examination Committee, collaborates with faculty to prepare timetables for theory examinations as part of the internal evaluation process. Heads of departments oversee the assessment of courses within their disciplines, apart from theory examinations.

Faculty members utilize diverse assessment methods such as case studies, oral examinations, PowerPoint presentations, quizzes (including multiple-choice and true/false questions), and short-answer tests. After each assessment, teachers provide feedback and discuss answers with students, guiding them on how to improve for future examinations. The Principal reviews internal evaluations at the end of each term or semester to ensure consistent academic standards.

Practical courses are continuously evaluated, with marks assigned to each practical. Case studies are incorporated to enhance report writing skills and expose students to real-life challenges. M.Com. students also complete a short research

project, with continuous evaluation and regular presentations monitored by project supervisors.

To alleviate examinations pressure, open-book tests are held for M.Com. students, encouraging the use of multiple reference books and fostering application-based thinking. Special examinations are conducted for students participating in sports, NSS, and NCC activities to accommodate their schedules.

Examination and Evaluation Framework

The College ensures that all students are well-informed about examination schedules and procedures. An orientation program at the beginning of the academic year familiarizes students with the internal evaluation system. Examination schedules, outlined in the Academic Calendar, are strictly followed to maintain consistency.

Internal Evaluation

The internal evaluation process includes diverse components such as case studies, oral exams, PowerPoint presentations, quizzes (MCQs and True/False questions), and short-answer questions. Answer scripts are discussed with students to provide constructive feedback and guidance for improvement. Practical assessments emphasize skill development through case studies, enabling students to address real-world issues and refine report-writing abilities.

M.Com. students complete short research projects, monitored continuously by project supervisors. Open-book tests are conducted to reduce exam pressure. Special provisions, including makeup exams, are made for students engaged in sports, NSS, or NCC activities.

Technology Integration

The College leverages ICT tools such as the G-Suite platform for conducting online exams for objective-type evaluations. During the pandemic, online examinations were conducted with appropriate measures to address technical issues, ensuring

inclusivity for all students.

Internship Program

Under SPPU's credit system, final-year students participate in internships for practical exposure. An Internship Committee and designated coordinator assist students with placements and address challenges, ensuring smooth execution.

The College ensures a structured approach to address and resolve student grievances related to evaluation and examinations at multiple levels:

Faculty Level: Continuous student evaluation through internal tests, assignments, practicals, and case studies is conducted by faculty members. Marks obtained in internal assessments are shared with students, who can raise concerns, if any, with their respective course instructors. These grievances are discussed and resolved promptly at the faculty level.

College Level: A Senior Supervisor is appointed to oversee the smooth conduct of examinations. Any issues faced by students during online, theory, or practical exams are addressed by the institution's Chief Examination Officer (CEO) in consultation with the Principal. This ensures timely and fair resolution of grievances arising during examinations.

University Level: For grievances related to results, mark sheet corrections, or certificates issued by Savitribai Phule Pune University (SPPU), queries are forwarded by the College Examination Section to the university. Students dissatisfied

with the evaluation process can apply for revaluation, rechecking, or request a photocopy of answer scripts by paying the required fees. The college facilitates this process to ensure transparency and accountability.

Outcome-Based Education (OBE) and Attainment Process

The college offers undergraduate, postgraduate, and doctoral programs under the Faculty of Commerce affiliated with Savitribai Phule Pune University. The curriculum, designed by the university, follows the CBCS pattern, with undergraduate programs comprising 140 credits and postgraduate programs 80 credits.

Evaluation Structure: Assessment includes:

- 1. In-Semester Continuous Internal Evaluation (CIE)
- End-Semester University Evaluation The weightage for internal and external evaluations is 30:70 for theory and practical courses.

Each course defines specific Course Outcomes (COs) mapped to Program Outcomes (POs), which quantitatively measure the achievement of learning goals. COs and POs are evaluated using direct methods, and departments are required to submit CO attainment at the semester's end.

CO Attainment Assessment Process:

- 1. Internal tests, assignments, tutorials, and projects are aligned with COs.
- 2. CO attainment is calculated using a programmed Excel format.
- 3. Thresholds for Low (below 60%), Moderate (61-80%), and High (81-100%) attainment levels are predefined.

Action and Reporting:

- CO attainment is documented in teachers' diaries and reviewed by course coordinators and Heads of Departments.
- Discrepancies in attainment are analyzed, and improvement plans are devised.

Outcome-Based Education (OBE): The OBE Committee ensures CO-PO alignment using a CO/PO matrix. Both direct and indirect tools evaluate attainment, focusing on continuous improvement of educational outcomes.

4.2 - Library as a Learning Resource

The college library is a vital knowledge hub with a collection of around 55,000 books, magazines, periodicals, and research journals. Regular additions to the collection ensure students and faculty have access to the latest resources. The library offers a Book Bank facility to assist students with textbook loans. Additionally, the college subscribes to the N-LIST database, providing access to a vast collection of e-books and e-journals both on-campus and remotely via password-based access.

The library uses SOUL 3.0 Library Management Software developed by UGC INFLIBNET, which supports various library functions. It integrates barcoding technology for efficient issue and return processes. New arrivals and book transactions are communicated to students and faculty via email.

Two spacious reading rooms are available, particularly useful during exams. The library provides services like Internet browsing, computerized lending, stock verification, reprography, and inter-library loans. The 'Book Lovers' Group' encourages students to engage with literature by reviewing books, often with the presence of the authors.

Unique initiatives like 'Read a Book, Get a Pen' motivate students to read, and books reserved for study can be checked out overnight. Library orientation is conducted annually, introducing new students to available resources. The library also hosts exhibitions to celebrate important figures in history and offers special reference collections.

The college is a member of the Gokhale Institute of Politics and Economics and Jayakar Library, enabling staff to borrow books

from these institutions.

The college offers both aided and self-financed degree programs. It receives salary grants from the Government of Maharashtra for aided programs. For self-financed degree programs such as BBA, BBA(IB), BBA(CA), BVoc(BFIAS), PGDTL, PGDIB, PGDBFI, and Ph.D., no external grants are received, and student fees serve as the primary funding source.

The college covers the staff salaries for self-financed programs, as well as the costs for regular maintenance, housekeeping, and security, using the fees collected from students. Financial assistance for socially and economically disadvantaged students is provided through scholarships and free-ships from government agencies, as per established norms. International students' fees are reimbursed by the Indian Council for Cultural Relations (ICCR).

Development projects require approval from the Board of Trustees of the Modern Education Society. The college encourages alumni and philanthropists to contribute to the M.E. Society's educational initiatives, and these funds are used for college development. Additionally, the college seeks sponsorships from knowledge and activity partners for seminars, conferences, and research publications.

To support financially weak students, the college runs an Earn and Learn Scheme with partial funding from Savitribai Phule Pune University. Ness Wadia College of Commerce follows several waste management initiatives aligned with national goals such as the Swachh Bharat Abhiyan, plastic ban, and environmental sustainability. Solid Waste Management: Solid waste is collected daily from the college and hostel rooms by the housekeeping staff, using separate containers for segregation. The waste is assembled at a designated collection pit, where dry waste (paper, plastics, etc.) is sorted and sent to recycling centers or PMC collection points. Separate bins for dry/recyclable waste are placed in laboratories, classrooms, and the library.

Wet Waste Management: Wet waste, including cafeteria waste, is processed in a designated pit to create compost for use in the campus garden, promoting sustainable waste recycling.

Plastic Ban: Notices are posted around campus to encourage students and staff to avoid using plastics. Security personnel monitor the campus to prevent the entry of plastic in any form. Cafeteria and hostel areas are also strictly monitored to reduce plastic usage. Paper bags are encouraged as an alternative.

Waste Recycling System: The college follows a comprehensive waste management approach that focuses on waste disposal, reduction, reuse, and prevention. Methods such as recycling, composting, and waste-to-energy are employed to minimize environmental impact.

Faculty members utilize diverse assessment methods such as case studies, oral examinations, PowerPoint presentations, quizzes (including multiple-choice and true/false questions), and short-answer tests. After each assessment, teachers provide feedback and discuss answers with students, guiding them on how to improve for future examinations. The Principal reviews internal evaluations at the end of each term or semester to ensure consistent academic standards.

Practical courses are continuously evaluated, with marks assigned to each practical. Case studies are incorporated to enhance report writing skills and expose students to reallife challenges. M.Com. students also complete a short research project, with continuous evaluation and regular presentations monitored by project supervisors.

To alleviate examinations pressure, open-book tests are held for M.Com. students, encouraging the use of multiple reference books and fostering application-based thinking. Examination and Evaluation Framework

The College ensures that all students are well-informed about examination schedules and procedures. An orientation program at the beginning of the academic year familiarizes students with the internal evaluation system. Examination schedules, outlined in the Academic Calendar, are strictly followed to maintain consistency.

Internal Evaluation

The internal evaluation process includes diverse components such as case studies, oral exams, PowerPoint presentations, quizzes (MCQs and True/False questions), and short-answer questions. Answer scripts are discussed with students to provide constructive feedback and guidance for improvement.

Practical assessments emphasize skill development through case studies, enabling students to address real-world issues and refine report-writing abilities.

M.Com. students complete short research projects, monitored continuously by project supervisors. Open-book tests are conducted to reduce exam pressure. Special provisions, including makeup exams, are made for students engaged in sports, NSS, or NCC activities.

Technology Integration

The College leverages ICT tools such as the G-Suite platform for conducting online exams for objective-type evaluations. During the pandemic, online examinations were conducted with appropriate measures to address technical issues, ensuring inclusivity for all students.

Internship Program

Under SPPU's credit system, final-year students participate in internships for practical exposure. An Internship Committee and designated coordinator assist students with placements and address challenges, ensuring smooth execution.

The College ensures a structured approach to address and resolve student grievances related to evaluation and examinations at multiple levels:

Faculty Level: Continuous student evaluation through internal tests, assignments, practicals, and case studies is conducted

by faculty members. Marks obtained in internal assessments are shared with students, who can raise concerns, if any, with their respective course instructors. These grievances are discussed and resolved promptly at the faculty level.

College Level: A Senior Supervisor is appointed to oversee the smooth conduct of examinations. Any issues faced by students during online, theory, or practical exams are addressed by the institution's Chief Examination Officer (CEO) in consultation with the Principal. This ensures timely and fair resolution of grievances arising during examinations.

University Level: For grievances related to results, mark sheet corrections, or certificates issued by Savitribai Phule Pune University (SPPU), queries are forwarded by the College Examination Section to the university. Students dissatisfied with the evaluation process can apply for revaluation, rechecking, or request a photocopy of answer scripts by paying the required fees. The college facilitates this process to ensure transparency and accountability.

Outcome-Based Education (OBE) and Attainment Process

The college offers undergraduate, postgraduate, and doctoral programs under the Faculty of Commerce affiliated with Savitribai Phule Pune University. The curriculum, designed by the university, follows the CBCS pattern, with undergraduate programs comprising 140 credits and postgraduate programs 80 credits.

Evaluation Structure: Assessment includes:

- 1. In-Semester Continuous Internal Evaluation (CIE)
- 2. End-Semester University Evaluation The weightage for internal and external evaluations is 30:70 for theory and practical courses.

Each course defines specific Course Outcomes (COs) mapped to Program Outcomes (POs), which quantitatively measure the achievement of learning goals. COs and POs are evaluated using direct methods, and departments are required to submit CO attainment at the semester's end.

CO Attainment Assessment Process:

- 1. Internal tests, assignments, tutorials, and projects are aligned with COs.
- 2. CO attainment is calculated using a programmed Excel format.
- 3. Thresholds for Low (below 60%), Moderate (61-80%), and High (81-100%) attainment levels are predefined.

Action and Reporting:

- CO attainment is documented in teachers' diaries and reviewed by course coordinators and Heads of Departments.
- Discrepancies in attainment are analyzed, and improvement plans are devised.

Outcome-Based Education (OBE): The OBE Committee ensures CO-PO alignment using a CO/PO matrix. Both direct and indirect tools evaluate attainment, focusing on continuous improvement of educational outcomes.

4.2 - Library as a Learning Resource

The college library is a vital knowledge hub with a collection of around 55,000 books, magazines, periodicals, and research journals. Regular additions to the collection ensure students and faculty have access to the latest resources. The library offers a Book Bank facility to assist students with textbook loans. Additionally, the college subscribes to the N-LIST database, providing access to a vast collection of e-books and e-journals both on-campus and remotely via password-based access.

The library uses SOUL 3.0 Library Management Software

developed by UGC INFLIBNET, which supports various library functions. It integrates barcoding technology for efficient issue and return processes. New arrivals and book transactions are communicated to students and faculty via email.

Two spacious reading rooms are available, particularly useful during exams. The library provides services like Internet browsing, computerized lending, stock verification, reprography, and inter-library loans. The 'Book Lovers' Group' encourages students to engage with literature by reviewing books, often with the presence of the authors.

Unique initiatives like 'Read a Book, Get a Pen' motivate students to read, and books reserved for study can be checked out overnight. Library orientation is conducted annually, introducing new students to available resources. The library also hosts exhibitions to celebrate important figures in history and offers special reference collections.

The college is a member of the Gokhale Institute of Politics and Economics and Jayakar Library, enabling staff to borrow books from these institutions.

The college offers both aided and self-financed degree

programs. It receives salary grants from the Government of Maharashtra for aided programs. For self-financed degree programs such as BBA, BBA(IB), BBA(CA), BVoc(BFIAS), PGDTL, PGDIB, PGDBFI, and Ph.D., no external grants are received, and student fees serve as the primary funding source.

The college covers the staff salaries for self-financed programs, as well as the costs for regular maintenance, housekeeping, and security, using the fees collected from students. Financial assistance for socially and economically disadvantaged students is provided through scholarships and free-ships from government agencies, as per established norms. International students' fees are reimbursed by the Indian Council for Cultural Relations (ICCR).

Development projects require approval from the Board of Trustees of the Modern Education Society. The college encourages alumni and philanthropists to contribute to the M.E. Society's educational initiatives, and these funds are used for college development. Additionally, the college seeks sponsorships from knowledge and activity partners for seminars, conferences, and research publications.

To support financially weak students, the college runs an Earn and Learn Scheme with partial funding from Savitribai Phule Pune University. The Board of Students Development, Savitribai Phule Pune University, funds various student-centric and NSS activities. Solid Waste Management: Solid waste is collected daily from the college and hostel rooms by the housekeeping staff, using separate containers for segregation. The waste is assembled at a designated collection pit, where dry waste (paper, plastics, etc.) is sorted and sent to recycling centers or PMC collection points. Separate bins for dry/recyclable waste are placed in laboratories, classrooms, and the library.

Wet Waste Management: Wet waste, including cafeteria waste, is processed in a designated pit to create compost for use in the campus garden, promoting sustainable waste recycling.

Plastic Ban: Notices are posted around campus to encourage students and staff to avoid using plastics. Security personnel monitor the campus to prevent the entry of plastic in any form. Cafeteria and hostel areas are also strictly monitored to reduce plastic usage. Paper bags are encouraged as an alternative.

Waste Recycling System: The college follows a comprehensive waste management approach that focuses on waste disposal, reduction, reuse, and prevention. Methods such as recycling, composting, and waste-to-energy are employed to minimize environmental impact.
